# Spring Lake Park City Hall Renovation and **Expansion Project Progress**

Construction is underway on the renovation and expansion of City Hall. The project is progressing smoothly and is on schedule. Below is a summary of the construction progress so far.

- New Addition: The new addition to City Hall is now enclosed, and framing work is underway. Electrical and low voltage cabling are being run into the link. We are awaiting glass to be installed in the new addition. Despite being slowed down by the rain, roofing work is progressing.
- Interior Modifications: Interior modifications to the old Public Works garage are underway to accommodate its new use as the Police Department garage. Preliminary framing work has begun on the multi-purpose room and City Council chambers. New office furniture has been purchased for the new Police Department area and Recreation offices. A new emergency generator has been purchased and will be installed later this summer.

It is anticipated that the Police Department and Recreation Department will move into their new spaces at the end of July. At that point, the Administration Department will temporarily move from its current location into the new multi-purpose room. Residents will be able to access these areas from the front entrances at that time. Work on the remaining project includes the renovation of the current Police Department to accommodate officer locker rooms, the Emergency Operations Center and staff conference rooms, as well as the current Administration space which will remain for Administration/ Utility Billing and Building Department staff. Work is anticipated to be completed at the end of 2024.







# **City Council Appoints New City Assessors**

# City Council Filing Opens July 30

There will be two (2) City Council Member seats up for election on the November 5, 2024 General Ballot. The two (2) Council Member seats will be four-year terms (2025-2028).

If you are interested in running for an open seat, you must file an Affidavit of Candidacy. Candidate filing packets will be available July 30 at City Hall from 8:00 AM - 4:30 PM.

The filing period will open on Tuesday, July 30 and will close on Tuesday, August 13 at 5:00 PM. The cost to file is \$15 and must be paid with cash, check or credit card. If you use a credit card, there will be a \$3.00 flat fee applied for processing.

Candidates may withdraw from the ballot by filing an Affidavit of Withdrawal at any time during the filing period and through Thursday, August 15 at 5:00 PM. Filing fees are non-refundable.

#### **PRIMARY ELECTION - 2024**

Spring Lake Park residents who are unable to go to their polling place on Primary Election Day may cast an absentee ballot by mail or in-person during the 46 days prior to the election.

Voters who prefer to cast their absentee ballot in-person may do so at the Spring Lake Park City Hall during the hours 8:00 AM to 4:15 PM Monday through Friday. In-person absentee balloting will also be available at City Hall on the Saturday, August 10, 2024 from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM and until 5:00 PM on Monday, August 12, 2024.

The absentee balloting period for the Primary Election, August 13, 2024, runs from Friday, June 28 through Monday, August 12.

Voters who live in Anoka County and wish to vote absentee by mail can download the absentee ballot application any time at www.anokacounty.us/absenteevoting or they may call 763-324-1300 to have an absentee ballot application sent to them.

Voters who live in Ramsey County and wish to vote absentee by mail, can download the absentee ballot application any time at www.co.ramsey.mn.us/elections/absentee or they may call 651-266-2171 to have an absentee ballot application sent to them.



### **GENERAL ELECTION - 2024**

Spring Lake Park residents who are unable to go to their polling place on General Election Day may cast an absentee ballot by mail or in-person during the 46 days prior to the election.

Voters who prefer to cast their absentee ballot in-person may do so at the Spring Lake Park City Hall during the hours 8:00 AM to 4:15 PM, Monday through Friday. In-person absentee balloting will also be available at City Hall on Saturday, October 26, from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM; Tuesday, October 29, from 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM; Saturday, November 2 and Sunday, November 3, from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM and Monday, November 4, until 5:00 pm.

The absentee balloting period for the General Election, November 5, 2024, runs from Friday, September 20, 2024 through Monday, November 4, 2024.

# Absentee Voting at Spring Lake Park City Hall Amid Construction

As Spring Lake Park City Hall undergoes a significant renovation, city officials are ensuring that the construction work does not impede the democratic process. Despite the ongoing construction, absentee voting will remain fully accessible to residents, guaranteeing that everyone has the opportunity to cast their ballots without interruption.

To accommodate voters, City Hall will still be open for absentee voting. Voters can enter City Hall through the entrance on 81st Avenue NE. There is a sign outside the door labeled "City Hall Entrance".

Election staff at City Hall want to stress the importance of maintaining voting accessibility during the construction period. Staff understand that construction can be disruptive, but we are committed to making sure that every resident has the opportunity to vote absentee if they choose. Staff are taking steps to ensure the process runs smooth and efficient, despite the ongoing construction work

For those who prefer to avoid any potential disruptions, the City is also encouraging the use of mail-in absentee ballots. This option allows voters to request a ballot be sent to their home. A ballot can be obtained by visiting *mnvotes.org*, and registering to absentee vote.

# Safe Medication Disposal

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# **City of Spring Lake Park Code Enforcement Department**

The Code Enforcement Division's primary goal is keeping Spring Lake Park a healthy, safe, and beautiful place to live. Code Enforcement staff is responsible for the implementation of many sections of the City's Code of Ordinances. Ordinances are local laws which exist to promote our community standards, safeguard the quality of life for our residents, and protect housing investments for years to come. The code of ordinances governs many things, including, but not limited to, property maintenance, nuisances, signage, and zoning. Code Enforcement staff responds to inquiries and complaints regarding code issues. If a violation of the code is found to exist, typically a letter will be sent which outlines the steps that need to be taken to correct the violation.

In many instances, residents are simply unaware of the Code and correct the situation immediately. In the event the correction is not made in a reasonable amount of time, the code enforcement officer may issue an administrative citation to the violator. Residents may appeal the citation through the administrative hearing process.

# **How to Report Violations**

When reporting a zoning code violation, please leave your name, address, telephone number, and email as well as the address and specific nature of the code violation. This information is necessary to allocate staff appropriately. Staff may also need to contact you in the event there are any questions regarding the nature of the complaint. You may report a complaint via standard mail, online, over the phone, or in person at City Hall. Point of contact for all complaints is Walter Morris (wmorris@slpmn.org).

# **Confidentiality**

All information will remain confidential per MN State Statue 13.44, which states: "The identities of individuals who register complaints with state agencies or political subdivisions concerning violations of state law or local ordinances concerning the use of real property are classified as confidential data." (Section 13.02, Subdivision 3).

# **Inspection Process**

The City Code Inspector, Walter Morris, will inspect the property. If a violation is present, it will be documented and a zoning violation letter will be mailed to the property owner. If corrective action is not taken within an appropriate amount of time, the City Code Inspector will mail out an administrative citation for zoning code violation.

The purpose of these guidelines is to develop a standardized procedure to ensure proper communication between staff, the complainant, and the party in violation in resolving issues present in the community.

# **Enjoy Your Recreational Fires Safely Portable Outdoor Fireplaces**

A portable outdoor fireplace is a solid-fuel-burning unit made from noncombustible materials like steel, concrete, or clay. These fireplaces can be open or have a small hearth opening with a chimney.

#### **Recreational Fires**

In Minnesota, recreational fires are a wonderful way to enjoy outdoor activities. Here are some key safety guidelines:

- **Distance**: Keep fires at least 25 feet from buildings and combustible materials, and 10 feet from LP-Gas containers.
- **Safety**: Always eliminate conditions that could cause a fire to spread and keep a portable fire extinguisher or other fire-extinguishing equipment nearby.
- Materials: Burn only wood from trees, small branches, brush, or charcoal. Do not burn treated lumber, construction debris, garbage, plastic, or waste materials.
- **Supervision**: Attend your fire at all times until it is fully extinguished.
- **Compliance**: Extinguish fires immediately if they pose a safety risk or if instructed by a fire code official.

Enjoy your fires responsibly while creating wonderful memories outdoors.

# Stay Safe with Fires and Barbecues on Balconies and Patios

Minnesota State Fire Code Appendix O Highlights:

- 1. Open Flame Prohibited: No open flames or fires on balconies above ground level or ground floor patios within 15 feet of a structure in buildings with three (3) or more dwelling units.
- 2. Fuel Storage Prohibited: No storing or using fuel, barbecues, torches, or similar devices in prohibited areas. *Exception*: Permanently mounted and wired/plumbed electric or gas grills with an 18-inch clearance (or as listed) are allowed with approval.

#### **Safety Tips for Barbecuing:**

- Charcoal Storage: Store in a dry area to prevent spontaneous heating.
- Outdoor Use Only: Barbecue grills should only be used and stored outdoors.
- **Proper Disposal**: Let charcoal briquettes cool naturally and dispose of them safely.
- **Lighter Fluid Storage**: Store away from living areas.
- **Propane Cylinder Storage**: Store cylinders outside, at least 10 feet from building openings.
- Compliance with NFPA 58: Follow guidelines for propane cylinder storage and transportation.

# **Safe Escape Planning**

Fire is fast. On average, a fire doubles in size every 30 seconds. Are you prepared to safely escape your home in the event of a fire?

It is important to have a home fire escape plan. Working with those in your home, start by drawing a map of your home. Indicate all doors and windows. These are your two possible exits out of any given room. Walking through your home, locate all smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms. Next, indicate an outside meeting place. A meeting place should be in front of your home, on the same side of the street as your home. After escaping and arriving at your meeting place, call 9-1-1. Never re-enter the home. Stay at your meeting place until emergency personnel arrive.

Live in an apartment building? Locate all stairwells on your floor. If the one closest is blocked by fire or smoke, then you might have to use another stairwell to exit.

Know your safe escape plan! Practice your plan regularly, at least twice a year. Remember, if there is a fire you need to get outside and stay outside! Call for help. Never go back inside.

# **Safety Tips to Prevent Becoming a Crime Statistic**

With the weather warming up and the days being longer, it means more people are out and about. With that being said, there are also criminals out and about. Here are some tips to help keep you from becoming a crime statistic:

- Lock your doors, including the one between your garage and house. Unlocked doors make easy access for criminals.
- Don't keep your garage door opener in your vehicle if you park outside. This will give easy access to your home if your vehicle is broken into.
- If you're going on vacation, ask a trusted neighbor to gather your mail so it does not pile up. Also, use a timer or Wi-Fi controlled lights to make it appear someone is home.
- The best deterrent for crime is light! Keep the exterior lights on your home turned on, or install a motion sensing light to keep the criminals away. The use of cameras or video doorbells is also helpful.

# **Summer Heat Safety**

Excessive heat during the summer months can pose dangerous risk to your health. Excessive heat is usually high temperatures combined with high humidity levels that persist for two or more days. Here are some tips to help survive the heat and humidity we get here in Minnesota:

- 1. Know the difference between Heat Stroke, Heat Cramps and Heat Exhaustion
  - ♦ Heat Stroke is a <u>very serious condition</u> that requires immediate medical attention - Call 9-1-1! Here are some warning signs:
    - Extremely high body temperature, above 103° F
    - Hot, red, dry skin with NO sweat
    - Rapid, strong pulse
    - Dizziness, confusion and possibly unconsciousness

- ♦ **Heat Exhaustion** is sweating profusely, paleness, tiredness or weakness, headache, nausea or vomiting
  - For both heat cramps and exhaustion, move to a cooler location and remove excessive clothing.
     Only take small sips of water, and if symptoms don't improve, see your doctor or health care provider.
- ♦ Heat Cramps are muscle pains or spasms in the stomach, legs or arms
- 2. NEVER leave children, disabled person or pets locked in a vehicle! There were 33 reported children who died in hot cars in 2022.
- 3. Avoid strenuous activities, especially during the mid-day hours when the sun is at its highest.
- 4. Make sure to stay hydrated with water or sports drinks, and wear light colored clothing.






# September is Back to School Time

# **Online Safety Tips**

A little bit of knowledge and some effort can help keep you and your sensitive data safe in this online world. Here are a few tips to help keep you safe while online:

- Create unique, long passwords that are hard to guess by using numbers, symbols and capital letters. Also use multi-factor authentication if possible.
- Watch for malicious links in emails, especially from unsolicited or unfamiliar senders. These links can contain virus that could be downloaded onto your computer.
- Only use secure Wi-Fi networks as public ones could allow cybercriminals to see what you are doing on your laptop or smartphone. The use of a virtual private network (VPN) can help make the connection more secure.
- Be knowledgeable regarding the numerous scams that are out there, such as the romance or lottery scams.

  Remember, there is no such thing as free money!

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# **Lawn Sprinkling Regulations**

Per Resolution No. 93-17, sprinkling is limited to an ODD/EVEN basis. Properties with addresses that end in an odd number may sprinkle on an odd numbered day. Properties that end in an even number may sprinkle on an even numbered day.

New sod and seed are exempt for a period of two (2) weeks after installation. Properties with a private well are encouraged to follow this same schedule. Uniform compliance throughout the City is less confusing to the public and Code Enforcement Officials. We also encourage you to water your lawn and gardens in the early morning when the water can penetrate the soil without evaporating as quickly. Placing your sprinklers where they will water your lawn and not driveways, sidewalks and streets will also reduce waste.

In addition, check your outside faucets and sprinklers for leaks. It is also a good idea to monitor your summer water usage by reading your water meter on a regular basis. Please keep in mind that meters read in 1,000 gallons. That way if it is a drier summer, you may decide to scale back on your watering to reduce the potential of a big bill in October. The October bill will reflect water usage from July through September.

During especially dry years, additional water conservation measures may be imposed. Check the Blaine/SLP Life,

the City's website or the City's Facebook page for any additional watering restrictions.



# Why Are These Colored Flags In My Yard?

If you have ever asked yourself that, the answer is simple. These flags (or paint) are indicators of located underground utilities. Minnesota State Statute requires anyone who will be digging underground to contact Gopher State One Call (GSOC) at least 48 hours in advance of doing so. GSOC is the on-call notification system that acts as a communication link between underground facility operators, homeowners, and excavators in the State of Minnesota.

#### **Paint or Flag Color Indicator**

When a notification or ticket is received, GSOC contacts the

local utility companies and asks them to mark any underground utilities in a given area. As indicated on the accompanying chart, each utility type has a color assigned to it.

WHITE	Area of proposed excavation
PINK	Temporary survey markings
RED	Electronic
YELLOW	Gas, oil, steam, propane
ORANGE	Communication, CATV, fiber
BLUE	Water
PURPLE	Reclaimed water, irrigation
GREEN	Sewer

# Lawn Care Tips

# Mow at higher setting

Grass mowed to a height of 2 1/2 to 3 inches develops deeper, healthier roots and has a competitive advantage over weeds, which helps prevent them from taking over your yard.

#### Fertilize smart

Most Minnesota lawns only need to be fertilized once a year in the fall. Fertilizer containing phosphorous is unnecessary as soils in our area already contain enough phosphorous to maintain most lawns.

### Water less frequently

Most lawns require one (1) inch of water a week. Watering too frequently encourages the grass roots to remain near the surface. By watering less frequently but more thoroughly, roots are forced to search more deeply for moisture, which results in longer, healthier root systems that can tolerate the hot summer months.

# Manage grass clippings

Do not blow or rake grass clippings and leaves into the street. Leave them on the lawn. Leaves and grass clippings can be used for compost, or you can bag them up and bring them to the yardwaste site.

#### Seed bare patches to prevent erosion and soil loss

If you have trouble growing grass in a certain area of the yard, such as a shady spot or on a steep slope, consider replacing that section of the lawn with other plants that are more tolerant of the conditions.

#### Aerate the lawn periodically to loosen the soil

Aeration is done with a machine that pulls two (2) to three (3) inch cores of soil from the lawn allowing air, water, and nutrients to be incorporated into the soil. This improves plant health and water infiltration.

If you have hired a contractor for landscaping, driveway work, or underground digging, they are required to contact Gopher State One Call. If you are planning on digging yourself, you are also required to do so at least 48 hours in advance. The number to call is easy – 811 or make your request online at **GSOCsubmit.org.** 

Gopher State One Call's website (**gopherstateonecall.org**) has a lot of helpful information, including a way to look up ticket requests by city, street or date.

# Recycle Smart – Do Not Put Bulky Plastics in your Recycling Cart

It might be tempting to put that broken hamper in your curbside recycling cart or bring your child's large worn toy to the recycling center... it's plastic, so it's recyclable, right? Actually, that IS NOT correct. Curbside programs are set up to sort plastic bottles, cups and containers #1, #2 and #5.

Large, bulky plastic items like children's toys, kiddie pools, lawn furniture, laundry hampers, plant pots, buckets and other large plastic household items, should not be put in a curbside recycling cart. Drop-off centers don't want them either because they ARE NOT recyclable.

If not damaged, consider reuse and donate these types of items. If damaged, contact your hauler before throwing away for more details and to see if there is a charge for disposal.





Reuse or donate these items if they're not broken. If they are not reusable, they ARE NOT recyclable and must be put in your trash.

# **Spring Lake Park Curbside Recycling Information**

The City of Spring Lake Park is contracted with Walter's Recycling and Refuse for residential recycling needs. Here are some things you should know:



**Recycling Carts:** Recycling carts are available in 30, 60, and 90 gallon varieties. If you need a cart, your cart is broken, or you would like to request an additional or different size cart, please contact Walter's at 763-780-8464. There is no additional charge for a cart exchange or for an additional cart.

**Missed Collection:** If your recycling cart was at your curb by 6:30 AM on your designated collection day and it was not picked up by 6:00 PM, please call Walter's at 763-780-8464 by noon the day following your missed pick up. Please remember to leave your recycling cart out so the hauler will be able to pick it up after we report the missed collection.

**Moving In/Out:** If you are just moving in, there should be a recycling cart at your home for you use. The recycling cart is green with an orange lid and should say "Walter's" on the side. If there is no cart present, please call Walter's to arrange for a cart to be delivered to your home. If you are moving out, please leave your empty cart in the garage. If you need a special pick up to empty the cart and it is not your normal recycling day, please call Walter's to make arrangements to have it emptied.



**Extra Cardboard:** Cardboard boxes can be flattened and tied into bundles no more than three (3) feet by three (3) feet by one (1) foot tall and placed next to your recycling cart. There is no charge for additional recycling.



# **Clean Water Starts at Home**

#### **Lawn & Pet Care Tips**

A University of Minnesota research study sourced two main water pollutants in the Mississippi River in the Twin Cities Metro, nitrogen and phosphorus, to homeowners and dog owners. Excess amounts of these nutrients can cause algal blooms which can be harmful to aquatic critters and possibly harbor toxic blue-green algae.

The main source of nitrogen? Household fertilizer use: 10 times the amount of commercial fertilizers used by golf courses and college campuses in the Metro. A main source of phosphorus? Dog waste!

Prevention is easy and vastly cheaper than treatment. Treatment is not done at a building facility like wastewater from your sink and toilet. It is done with stormwater ponds, rain gardens, vegetation buffers, special in-ground sand filters, or other landscape methods.

Your daily actions, or inactions, make a difference. Do these two simple things at home:


## 1. Test before you fertilize

Get out of the habit of thinking your lawn or turf area needs fertilizing every year. Test your soil and get recommendations by the UMN Soils Research Lab for just \$20. Go to <a href="https://soiltest.cfans.umn.edu/">https://soiltest.cfans.umn.edu/</a> for a how-to video and in-depth information or call 612-625-3101 for more information.

Tip: leaving your grass clippings on your lawn when you mow recycles the nutrients from the clippings back into the soil. Doing this all season is like one application of fertilizer! Make sure your clippings are no more than one-inch long.

Tip: If you use a lawncare service check that they are using best practices from a special Turf Maintenance training where turf professionals learn from other professionals. This training costs little, is ½ day, and includes a voluntary certification option.

Though "organic," dog waste contains *E. coli* bacteria <u>and</u> phosphorus. Dogs average 200lbs of waste per dog per year. So, it's important to promptly pick up their waste, even in your backyard, and put it in the trash. Otherwise, rain storms can take it from our sidwalks and streets to flow into ponds, creeks, lakes, and rivers.

# **Water Education Grant Money Available**
